It was amazing to see how the students interacted with the pros on that particular day. The attire that students wore to school represented the many job paths they wished to pursue. At the event, invited professionals met with the students in accordance with their selected vocations and discussed the fundamentals of the specific career as well as the importance of their academic work.





KNUST SCHOOL FRUITS WEEK



At KNUST Primary School, learners have embraced and have been fervently pursuing SDGs 1, 3, 4, 5, 13, and 17. To promote sustainable development in the lives of students and teachers, each SDG has been incorporated into extra curricula activities. They hold Fruits Week every month as part of SDG3 (Good health and well-being) in an effort to instil in students the habit of consuming fruits in order to promote good health and well-being. "Good health and good sense are two of life's greatest benefits," said Publilius Syrus. To achieve this goal, the KNUST Primary School is in collaboration with Fruity Star Ghana who offer support to the school in organizing fruit bazaar to introduce learners and teachers to the many exotic and tropical fruits available. Again, at the school's cafeteria, there are three (3) fruit vendors where learners and teachers can buy fresh fruits such as oranges, grapes, apples, bananas. watermelons, mangoes, dragon fruits etc, on daily basis.



PLASTIC SEGREGATION PROJECT AT KNUST BASIC SCHOOL

Not only can plastic trash negatively impact biodiversity, but also human health. A systematic shift to value, redesign, and reuse of plastic trash has been actively promoted at KNUST Primary School as a result of the adoption of SDG13 (Climate Action). This is necessary in any environment where resources are valued, redesign, and reuse are practised. The impact of plastic trash on human lives is immense, hence it is crucial to take early steps to change people's attitudes about the usage of plastics in today's society.

Learners at KNUST Primary School and their Coordinator have decided to implement plastic segregation (separation) on a block basis as part of their commitment to reduce the threat of plastic waste in society. Recycle Up Ghana, an Accra-based recycling business, supplied three baskets for each block. Each of these baskets is for plastic bottles and comes in a variety of colours, including red, blue, and orange. In this challenge, the block with the most kilogrammes of plastic garbage at the end of the week is declared the winner for the week and awarded a prize. D5 Innovate, a printing hub in Kumasi, has contributed a trophy to be given to the winners on a yearly basis (the overall winner) as part of the awards. The plastics are later sold to Recycle GH (a recycle company in Kumasi), who recycle the plastics for other useful materials. This exercise has really promoted a very clean school environment and everyone is very much excited and enthused about the whole exercise. They have had parents carrying bags of plastic waste to their ward's class just for them to win. KNUST Primary School has shown that when we are committed to achieving a sustainable and clean environment, when can succeed.





AN ASSOCIATED SCHOOL FOR UNESCO INSTITUTE AN ENDOWMENT FUND

The WIT school, which has been operating for half a decade since June 2018, chose Mrs. Yakubu as brand ambassador for the role due to her dedication and immense contribution to the development of the school over the years, in addition to being the parent of two gifted students. As the school's ambassador, Mrs. Yakubu lead projects aimed at impacting the school and society, such as leading fundraising efforts through the newly launched WIT Endowment Fund (WEF) to support needy but brilliant students in deprived communities across the nation to fulfil goals 4 and 10, quality education and reduced inequality of the sustainable development goals.

The Endowment Fund aims to bridge the financial gap for enthusiastic, brilliant, but needy students to enable them to attain higher academic laurels. Spearheaded by Mrs. Yakubu, WEF will have its source of funds from a donor group, fundraising, and a percentage from WIT students' school fees. The initiative will support beneficiaries through four key categories, including the Genius Scholarship program, the Edufund, Treasure Kids Newspaper weekend community projects; and the Rural Stem Project.

The event, which was held on Tuesday, April 25, 2023, at the forecourt of The WIT School in East Legon, was attended by a variety of notable guests, including media personalities, Miss Denise Addo (rep from the Ghana Commission for UNESCO) TwinsDontBeg Chukwuthepainter (artist), Mr. Farouk Yakubu (husband of the ambassador), PTA President, Mrs. Safoa Graham, Pastor Agnes Hagan (C3 Hope City Church), Rev Steve (School chaplain, Action Chapel Int.), Mrs. Lesley Mensah (Founder and President, Afra K Fashion & WiAfrica), and Mrs. Kesewaa Dotse (proud genius parent of TWS).





GREEN GHANA DAY AT ACCRA COLLEGE OF EDUCATION



As has been done over the past three years, Associations and Clubs for UNESCO at Accra College of Education participated in this year's Green Ghana Day on the 9th of June, 2023.

In a bid to nurture global citizenship in learners, while mobilizing them for the good of society, the Ghana Commission for UNESCO has since 2021, consistently brought together students and schools that are members of the Associations and Clubs for UNESCO, to participate in the Green Ghana Initiative by the President of Ghana. FOSTERING GLOBAL CITIZENS THROUGH MEMORY OF THE WORLD PROJECT



This was a pilot project which started with four countries: Ghana, UK, Indonesia and Netherlands. Two schools, Labone Senior High School and Accra College of Education Demonstration Basic School were selected to participate in the project.

Participants had opportunities to interact with the literature teacher from the College. In this journey, they learnt the history and the heritage of Ghana through literature. In addition, they also learnt about documentary heritage and its importance to the world. They as well shared the knowledge they have acquired about the world and the medium through which they gained the knowledge.

The project lasted for ten months and ended successfully. Students and teachers who took part in the project gained adequate knowledge on globalization through interactions with the other participants from UK. It was very interactive, educative and fun.

This section details simple activities students and teachers can engage in to promote SDGs at the local level.



1. No Poverty - End Poverty in all its forms everywhere.


 Donate things (clothes, food, time or money) you can spare to organizations and people that are dedicated to help vulnerable groups



2. Zero Hunger – End Hunger, achieve food security and improve nutrition and promote sustainable agriculture

- Prevent food waste. Save left-overs and donate them to Foodsharing companies or charitable organizations.
- Buy or portion food you can eat.

3. Good Health and Well-Being – Ensure healthy lives and promote well-being for all at all ages





- Try to find a kind of sport activity that you like and practice it.
 Sport and exercise is healthy, not only for your physical but also for your mental health.
- Inform yourself about mental health issues and talk about it in class. What kind of mental health issues are there? How are they expressed and what are measures to cope with them? Raise awareness for mental health issues without pathologizing them or classifying these as abnormal behaviours.

4. Quality Education – Ensure inclusive and equitable quality education and promote lifelong learning opportunities for all

- Organize a book club. Read together and exchange your thoughts on the book you all read.
- Establish a book exchange program, where students can bring books they have read and would like to share with their peers. Everyone is free to take and read the provided books.
- Promote Global Citizenship Education in your school.
- Join the Global Citizenship Movement.



5. Gender Equality - Achieve gender equality and empower all women and girls

Learn about gender-specific struggles and discrimination.
 Visualize them on a poster and formulate rules to prevent gender-discriminating behaviour. Try to unlearn stereotypical and discriminating perceptions and behaviours.



6. Clean Water and Sanitation – Ensure availability and sustainable management of water and sanitation for all

- Save water where possible. Take shorter showers or turn off the tap while brushing your teeth and washing your hands. Even small gestures can make a difference.
- · Learn to harvest rain water.



7. Affordable and Clean Energy – Ensure access to affordable, reliable, sustainable and modern energy for all

 Articulate your demand for clean energy through multiple means of expressions. Set up and sign a petition for it.



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


- 8. Decent Work and Economic Growth Promote sustained, inclusive and sustainable economic growth, full and productive employment and decent work for all
 - Identify your skills and nurture them to improve your chances to get engaged in decent work.



9. Industry, Innovation and Infrastructure – Build resilient infrastructure, promote inclusive and sustainable industrialization and foster innovation

- Create a youth & industry-led innovation hub. Bring together students with ideas and people with the means to put these ideas into action.
- Organize a school competition, in which students can present their ideas and innovations.



10. Reduced Inequalities — Reduce inequalities within and among countries

• Inform yourself about inequalities within your society. Which groups are facing inequalities? Put yourself in their place and try to imagine how they might feel with it. Conduct a role play/game with randomly assigned roles. After you internalized your role, the game manager asks a couple of questions. Those who can answer the question with 'yes' can take a step forward. In the end compare your positions in the room. Who stands in front and who stayed in the back? Develop an understanding for various forms of disparities and how they intersect.

11. Sustainable Cities and Communities – Make cities and human settlements inclusive, safe, resilient and sustainable

- Initiate your own project. Think about what things your neighborhood/ school/ classroom needs? Are there activities you can volunteer your services?
- · Seek to make your environment safe, resilient and sustainable.




12. Responsible Consumption and Production – Ensure sustainable consumption and production patterns

- Reflect: What are things you can make out of waste? What new purposes can they have? Recycle used materials and give them a new purpose.
- Consume the following in a sustainable way: food, electricity, water
- Set up water tanks at your school to harvest rain water. You
 can use this water for washing your hands, watering plants or
 flushing the toilets.



13. Climate Action - Take urgent action to combat climate change and its impact

 Create a poster on one climate-related problem of your choice and present it in your school and/or to your family and neighbors. Spread the information about climate change and its consequences.



14. Life Below Water - Conserve and sustainably use the oceans, seas and marine resources for sustainable development

 Ask your school to organize a "Waste-Collection-Day" where all students collect waste at your nearest body of water if any so it does not reach the sea and threaten sea life of fish and other animals.

15. Life on Land – Protect, restore and promote sustainable use of terrestrial ecosystems, sustainably manage forests, combat desertification, and halt and reverse degradation and halt biodiversity loss

- Create a school garden where you make room for wild flowers and insects such as ladybugs. This way you can also learn about planting and harvesting as well as the role insects play for our lives and our food.
- 16. Peace, Justice and Strong Institutions Promote peaceful and inclusive societies for sustainable development, provide access to justice for all and build effective, accountable and inclusive institutions at all levels



- Get in touch with someone with whom you normally would not talk to. Find out what differentiates you but also what you have in common. Try to dismantle some of your prejudice against certain groups of people.
- Engage in a project in your community. This way, you will
 contribute to a more peaceful and just society and get in
 touch with many different people. Try to see the added value
 of societal diversity but also the numerous things that unites
 us as human beings.
- Join the Global Citizenship movement
